

The Secondary School Students' A to Z Guide to Mougins School 2018/2019

This guide has been compiled to help both new and existing students to have a clear picture of what is expected of them whilst they are members of the Mougins School community. It relates both to work and behaviour, in and out of the classroom. It is presented in an easy to read A to Z form with an index at the end of the booklet.

We would encourage you not only to read it through, but also to keep it in an accessible place as a reference document.

The Guide will be the basis for discussion in some of your tutorial sessions.

Absence

Following any absence from School, you need to bring in a note from your parents explaining your absence. If one of your parents has already phoned or emailed the School during your absence, the note is not necessary.

If exceptionally you have to leave during the day, for a medical appointment for example, please inform your tutors at morning registration. Your parents will pick you up from the office. Before leaving, sign out in the book in the office. If you return before the end of School, sign back in.

If you feel unwell during the day, it will be Nurse Marian or a senior member of staff who decides if your parents should be contacted to come and take you home. The office will make the call to your parents. Under no circumstances should students phone their parents and ask to be collected. Please make sure you let us know of any changes to your contact phone numbers.

Activities

School finishes at 13h10 on a Wednesday afternoon to give you the opportunity to participate in activities – both sporting and cultural – in your local community. Some activities are also organised at School. If you are not attending an activity organised by school, you must go home.

A list of activities being organised in the local area and at School on Wednesday afternoons will be collected together and displayed from mid-September in the hall. There will also be a list of after school activities being organised on other days of the week and weekends.

Agendas

All students will be issued with an agenda, or diary, at the beginning of the school year. This is for you to write down homework and other information relating to your school life. Your tutors will be asking to see your agenda from time to time and may use it to communicate with your parents. Do not rely on your memory to remember your assignments. It may not be reliable by the time you settle down to your homework!

ASSR

The Attestation Scolaire de Sécurité Routière is now a compulsory part of scooter riding and car driving in France. It is a two-part, multi-choice examination – Level 1 is taken in Form 8 and Level 2 in Form 9. The examinations are in French. A student who does not succeed Level 1 in Form 8 can take it again in Form 9 – so can students who join the School after Form 8. In general, all scooter riders require Level 1, and both levels are required by any

student wishing to drive a car, accompanied by an adult, from the age of 16 or drive a “Voiture Sans Permis” – a small car, limited in speed, which can be driven without a driving licence. Level 2 can be taken from 14 – 18 years old, provided the candidate is still in full time education.

The examination is between either before or after the Easter vacation – there is only one session per year for each level. If you are interested, make sure you give your name in to Mr Hickmore when he asks for entries.

Attendance

To gain the most from your studies and achieve the grades and marks you deserve, it is very important to be at School. Apart from absence due to illness, which is unavoidable, you should be present at School for all your lessons. Students in examination classes – i.e. Forms 10 to 13 – will not be granted leave of absence during term-time.

Behaviour

For you to achieve your potential, the atmosphere in the classroom must be conducive to learning. This means that students and teachers can work without lessons being interrupted by behaviour that requires both to stop. It also means that outside the classroom our behaviour is both respectful to others and to the School campus. (See the **Code of Conduct**).

It is clear that bad behaviour will not be accepted and that measures will be taken to modify it. Offenders will be warned and continuation will result in punishment. They may be given extra work to do at home, join extra study sessions at lunchtimes and/or after school, receive an Information Slip (see later) or carry a report to be filled in by teachers in every lesson.

If your behaviour gives cause for concern, your subject teachers will liaise with your tutor who will undoubtedly be seeing you to discuss ways of improving the situation. Your tutor will contact your parents if and when he/she feels they should be involved. Persistent bad behaviour or a serious offence will be referred to the Headmaster.

Smoking is not permitted at School. Firstly, we are promoters of healthy behaviour and smoking does not fall into that category and secondly, we are situated in a forest environment with a high fire risk. Should students fall into this trap, their parents will be informed immediately. Suspension is likely to follow and a letter placed in the student’s file.

The School’s Drug Policy is very clear and any student suspected of being under the influence of drugs will undergo a very simple urine drug test, administered

by our fully qualified registered state school nurse. Of course, parents will be contacted for their authorisation prior to any testing of any student.

The first reason for adopting this measure is to stop the rumour that “all the older students are doing it” because that is far from the truth, and an insult to the majority of our students.

The second reason is to offer those who are unfortunately positively tested ONE chance. They will be given the time necessary to become negative and will subsequently be tested on a regular basis for an appropriate period of time. The test will identify the use of drugs for a period of up to 18 days prior to its administration. It is 99% viable and in very rare cases produces a “false negative” result. It cannot give a “false positive” result.

Any further positive tests could result in permanent exclusion from the School. Any student in possession of drugs on the school campus or its surrounding area will be permanently excluded.

Books

The School supplies textbooks. These will be distributed at the beginning of the year and returned by you at the end of the year. The books are generally covered with a plastic film to protect them and have a Mougins School stamp inside. Some teachers may ask you to cover the books to protect them further. At the beginning of the year, all new students entering the Secondary School will be asked for a **Book Deposit**. This will be invoiced alongside your School fees, and the amount kept until you leave the School. If you lose any books, or return them in an unusable condition at the end of each year, you will receive notification that the cost of the book has been deducted from your Book Deposit. Un-returned library books will be replaced in the same way.

Break times

You will have two breaks in the day – one from 10h15 to 10h30 and the other from 13h05 until 14h05 during which time you have your lunch.

Ball games may be played on the synthetic games pitch - soft balls only. Ball games are permitted on the Hard Court. The areas below and above the rocks are where students can sit or play without being hit by a ball. Remember to bring your own equipment – the PE Department will not lend you theirs!

Chewing Gum

Chewing is not permitted in School. Our reason for this policy is that many students do not know how to dispose of the chewing gum and believe that sticking it under tables and chairs, or throwing it on the ground is an acceptable practice. We have zero tolerance to chewing gum and offenders may be involved in community service around the School.

Code of Conduct

Mougins School is an International School educating children originating from all over the world. The behaviour of its students should reflect high levels of tolerance, respect and international understanding. We are committed to being a safe, healthy and honest community and this Code of Conduct shows what we expect of each other.

We come to school ready to learn, dressed appropriately and properly equipped.

- Be on time for school and each lesson.
- Bring to lessons all the necessary materials required (e.g. books, writing equipment, sports kit, etc.)

We treat others with kindness and respect and listen to their opinions.

- Speak to others and act in a way that will not offend
- Speak and listen to others with care and respect
- Speak to a teacher if you think something is wrong

We take responsibility for our actions.

- Deal with conflicts without violence
- Tell the truth
- Honour any commitments you make

We take responsibility to make sure we can all learn well.

- Actively participate in the lessons and produce your best work
- Complete homework to the best of your ability and hand it in on time
- Listen carefully, concentrate and allow others to concentrate
- Co-operate with your teachers and others in the class
- Leave the room and move between classes quietly and sensibly

We look after our school environment.

- Respect and take care of your own and other people's work and property
- Report any damage either to a teacher or to the school office

- Look after buildings, equipment and furniture
- Put all waste in the correct bin

Commendation Forms

These forms are awarded for work of a very high standard or for an exceptional effort or service to the community. A letter will be sent to parents when a student receives a Commendation Form.

Common Room

The Sixth Form Common Room is located on the ground floor of the gymnasium. It is reserved for Students in Forms 12 and 13 only. Students from other classes are not permitted in the Common Room at any time.

Damage to property

Each form has a class base or form room. It is the responsibility of each member of each form to look after his or her room. Please inform your tutor immediately if you notice something broken or damaged. Whilst furniture and equipment have a life span and will need replacing from time to time, items broken through misuse will be charged to the student(s) responsible.

Dining Room – Le Café des Amis

Lunch for Secondary School students begins at 13h05. A rota will be in place so you know what time your class is due to go for lunch. *Please do not leave your bags in the corridor outside the Dining Room.*

Most students choose to eat lunches prepared and cooked at school rather than bring their own packed lunch. Your parents will pay the required amount alongside your school fees (cost of 8€ per four-course meal). You will be issued with a badge that you pass over a computerised badge reader. This will record your passage through the dining room. If you decide not to eat on a particular day or you are absent, there will be no refund. If you are going on a School trip, and usually have lunch in the cafeteria, a packed lunch will be provided for you by the chef. Students who are away for a week or more will be refunded at the end of the year. Please do not take your card out of its protective cover.

If you are bringing your own cold lunch, you are able to eat with your fellow students in the dining room or on the terrace. We would ask you to clear away any rubbish you have and put it in the bins provided. Should you not have your

lunch, for some reason, you will be able to eat in the cafeteria. The cost of a “one off” meal is 9€, which you can pay on the day or the day after.

Mougins School International Diploma

This Diploma will be awarded to students on completion of their Secondary Education.

Dress

Whilst there is no school uniform at Mougins School, students are expected to be correctly and decently dressed for the environment in which they are working. For reasons of safety and to avoid damage to floors, high heels are not acceptable. Students ignoring these requirements will be required to change, which may involve a phone call to parents.

Examinations – Internal and External

Direct any questions about exams to the Examinations Officers Ms Downes or Mr Petrequin, or your tutors.

Internal, end of school year exams will be from Wednesday 5th June to Friday 14th June 2019. The last week of term will be used to go over exam papers. Some subject teachers will also set examinations at the end of the Autumn and Spring Terms.

(I)GCSE’s are taken at the end of Form 11. The mock examinations are sat from 14th January 2019 and the “real things” in May and June.

“AS” levels are taken at the end of Form 12

“A” levels are taken at the end of Form 13

American SAT I and SAT II’s can be registered online and are taken at the International School of Nice.

Your School fees cover the examination fees for a normal set of GCSE’s, AS and A Levels. **If, however, you wish to re-sit examinations, you will be responsible for the entry fees incurred.**

Fire Drill

The campus is equipped with a loud, two-tone siren. When you hear the alarm, you should leave the classroom you are in and assemble as quickly and calmly as possible on the synthetic grass area below the rocks. Form 13 should be nearest to the rocks and Early Years and Reception nearest the games pitch. Please line up quietly, facing the Science Building, and wait while your tutor

takes the register and a member of the Senior Management Team gives you instructions as to what to do next. Whether a fire drill, a real fire or an emergency of a different sort, you are asked to evacuate the buildings in the same calm, sensible manner. Every classroom has fire instructions posted on the wall, indicating your route to the assembly point.

Security Alarm

There is a separate alarm should it be necessary to “lock-down”. Students will be made aware of the siren and procedures they must follow.

Food

You may have brought a small snack to School to eat at break time. Please ensure any rubbish resulting from your snack finds its way into a bin. Please take care to re-cycle cans, plastic bottles and cartons in the yellow metal bins distributed throughout the campus. Eating, or drinking other than water, is not allowed in classrooms, unless it is a wet break time, or in the Science Labs, Hall or Library at any time. At lunchtime, you will be eating in the Dining Room or on the Dining Room Terrace, whether you have a meal cooked at School or bring your own packed lunch. (See Dining Room).

General Certificate of Secondary Education (GCSE)

These are examinations taken at the end of Form 11, following two years of study. Students typically take eight subjects, some, however, take one or two more, or less. English, French, Mathematics and Science (double award) are compulsory. You choose the other three subjects, referred to as “options”.

Options for GCSEs are made in the Spring Term when you are in Form 9. You will be presented with a list of nine subjects (currently: Art, Business Studies, Computer Studies, Drama, Geography, History, Music, Physical Education and Spanish) and asked to place them in your order of preference. We will attempt to give you three out of your top four choices, but it is not guaranteed.

In order to move into Form 12 and 13 (called 6th Form) and study for AS and A levels, you must achieve at least five GCSEs with Grade A*, A, B or C at the end of Form 11 and achieve a C or above in any subject you wish to study at AS level (B for Maths).

Hall

The hall is not part of the playground, but a large classroom, largely used for Performing Arts - i.e. Assemblies, Drama and Music. There should be no students in the hall, or on the mezzanines above the hall, at any time, unless they are part of an organised activity or lesson.

The lighting and sound equipment in the hall should only be used under the supervision of a member of staff or a senior student specifically trained in the technical aspect of performing arts.

Homework

At the beginning of the year you will be given a homework timetable (Form 7 to 11) which lets you know which subjects will be set on which nights of the week. Individual subject teachers will tell you when they require the homework to be handed in. You should write this information in your Agenda. Some teachers require the work the next day, others give assignments that last for a week. It is up to you to organise your time to complete the set tasks. AS and A level students are expected to work beyond set assignments. Therefore, Form 12 and 13 students are expected to work a minimum of 3,5 hours per week on each AS level and 5 hours per week on each A level.

Homework Slips

If you do not hand homework in on time, your subject teacher, for whom the work is intended, will fill in a Homework Slip. In addition to whatever action that teacher takes, the slip will be passed on to your tutor, who will discuss the issue with you. If a number of slips reach your tutor, your parents are likely to be contacted.

Information Slips

An information slip will be given if a student's behaviour is below the required standard or homework is constantly late or not done. One copy of the Information Slip is given to your tutor and another to the Headmaster. If you receive two slips, your tutor will probably contact your parents and a meeting will be set up. Should the situation not improve, the Headmaster will become involved and further steps taken to alter the situation. Further Information Slips would cause the student's place in the School to be reviewed.

Jewellery

We strongly advise you not to wear valuable jewellery to School for security reasons. All items of jewellery have to be removed during Physical Education lessons for safety reasons. It is probably better to leave jewellery at home, particularly on PE days.

Late Book

If you arrive at School after the second bell (08h55), you should go to the office and enter your details in the Late Book, which you find on the table directly in front of you as you go through the office door.

Library

The library is open every weekday from 09h00. Senior students may use it for private study during their study periods. Each student has their own card, which enables them to borrow books. On Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays students from Form 3 up to Form 13 can use the Library after School hours to do their homework, to study or to consult reference works.

This is a good way to get some of the work done before going home or to get help with sorting out the workload.

The homework club is not a play group and therefore the same library rules apply: **silence, no food or drink** (have a quick snack after lessons).

The librarian, Mrs Fabienne Hallett, will be at hand to help with any of these activities. If you would like to sign up for Homework Club, which begins on Monday 10th September, please collect a form from the Library. It should be signed by a parent or guardian and returned to Fabienne as soon as possible.

Litter

We have a beautiful environment in which to work. There are grey-coloured rubbish bins on stands and yellow re-cycling bins at various places throughout the campus. Please put all rubbish in the correct bin.

Lockers

There will be a set of lockers in your form room (Common Room for Forms 12 and 13). Lockers can be locked using a combination lock (with numbers, not a key), which you will need to supply. Students are advised to give the number, which will be kept confidential, to their tutors. Please keep your locker tidy and free from smelly sports clothing and rotting food.

Mobile Phones

Mobile Phones, I-Pods and I-Pads

As of September 2018, mobile phones are not visibly permitted in school during the school day. Students do not need mobile phones at school. If seen, the device will be confiscated and returned at the end of the day.

The School will take no responsibility for loss, damage or theft of these items. (It has happened many times already).

Mobile Phones as Cameras, Internet and French Law

There are more and more incidents in France and other European Countries concerning students photographing / filming in School using their mobile phones and subsequently transferring their photos / film to the Internet. Unless the people being filmed have specifically given permission for the clip to be posted on the Internet, - YouTube, Facebook etc, then doing so contravenes the Privacy Laws in France.

The School will contact parents immediately, if their child films and/or posts any such material on the Internet and may take legal action should it deem the material to be detrimental to any student, family or teacher.

Mobile Phones During Examinations and Tests

Whether sitting internal or external examinations, the use of mobile phones is totally forbidden. For external examinations, phones etc are systematically collected before entering the examination room. Teachers may choose to follow a similar practice before internal tests or examinations.

Newsletters

A newsletter is published once a month via the school website. It is the means by which the School communicates with members of its community – i.e. parents and students – and contains details of School and PTA functions, trips being organised and items of general interest to all. Please take the time to read it yourself.

Notice Boards

There are a number of notice boards giving information for students and parents. The parents' board is on the wooden fence by the entrance to the Hall. General information is also given on a board as you drive into the campus.

Nurse Marian

We are very fortunate to have a qualified nurse working full time at the School. Nurse Marian can be found in the Early Years classroom, off the stage in the hall or in the Medical Room, which is the first door on the left as you enter the back door of the Hall. If you are feeling unwell during the day, it is Nurse Marian or a senior member of staff who will decide if your parents should be called to come and fetch you. You may not call your parents and ask them to come and collect you. The office or Nurse Marian will make the call.

Off-Site

In the interest of safety, students in all forms up to and including Form 11 are not permitted to leave the School campus during the day. Forms 12 and 13 may leave the campus during lunchtimes, provided we have a signed permission form from their parents. If you have a lesson at lunchtime, you must make provision for lunch e.g. Packed lunch or canteen, as you will not be allowed to leave the campus, other than between 1.05 and 2.05.

Physical Education

In the interest of your health and safety, you need to come properly prepared for every PE lesson. You will need:

- A **Mougins School PE T-shirt**
- Plain **black sports shorts or leggings** – no pockets on the outside.
- Sports **trainers** – not fashion trainers with flat soles or skate-shoes. For outdoor lessons on the pitch, astro-boots are acceptable, but not studs.
- Shin pads for both football and hockey, and a gum shield for hockey
- A sweatshirt and tracksuit/jogging pants for cold weather – no patterns or bright colours.
- A **hair-band** for long hair.
- A **towel** for showers.
- To remove **all** jewellery, except for studs or small rings in the ears. No “friendship bands” allowed.

If you are unable to take part in a PE lesson, you must have a doctor’s certificate or a note from your parents, which you must bring to your PE teacher at the beginning of the lesson. If you do not have a letter excusing you, you will be expected to take part in the lesson.

We cannot accept responsibility for your valuables. We try to keep the changing rooms locked as much as possible during lessons, but there are times when they may be open. For this reason we insist that you do not bring valuable items to PE, but leave them either at home, or in your locker in your form-room.

We offer a wide range of lunchtime and after-school sports clubs and activities. You can find a copy of the programme for the whole school year on the PE notice board. You will have the opportunity to sign-up for these in lessons during the first week of term. Clubs are offered to all students, regardless of ability, and are seen as an opportunity for you to have fun and play more sport, and to improve your skills and grades in PE. For sports clubs we do not insist on Mougins School PE kit, but do expect you to change into suitable sports clothing. In activities in which we participate competitively against other

schools, preference will be given to those who attend clubs, but attendance does not necessarily guarantee you a place on the team.

We do not lend PE equipment to students for unsupervised play during breaks or after school, so please do not ask.

POCs

Just before the two half term breaks (end of October and middle of February), your teachers will fill a quick, internal assessment form. They will decide, for each subject you take, whether you should receive 'P for Praised', 'O for OK' or 'C for Cause for Concern' (POC). Just after the half term break, your tutors will feed back to you individually as to the content of your POC form. Together, you will decide on a course of action, if one is needed.

Prizegiving and Graduation

On the last day of the summer term, which is on Friday 28th June 2018, we will have our Secondary School Prizegiving starting at 10h30. Parents will be invited to attend. Students who have received four nominations or more from their subject teachers receive a prize. It is also when sports awards are made for athletics and games played throughout the year. Students who leave for the summer vacation before the end of term, and therefore miss the prize giving ceremony, will forfeit their prize.

The Graduation of the students in Form 13 will take place, as in previous years, in the early evening – 18h30. All families in the School will be invited to attend and we hope that as many as possible of you will be there to support the Form 13 students for their last day in the School.

Following the Graduation Ceremony, an aperitif and light refreshments will be served. Put the date in your agenda now, so you make sure you will be there at the end of this year.

Qualifications

If you follow your secondary education through to Form 13, you will be striving to gain a full set of qualifications with the highest grades possible. These qualifications will give you access to further education throughout the world, should that be your chosen path.

In our system, you should be striving to have at least 5 GCSE's with Grades A* - C, normally, but not exclusively achieved at the end of Form 11 (see GCSEs). Forms 12 and 13 are required to pass their AS levels at the end of Form 12, and

choose 3 or 4 of these subjects to continue to A Level in Form 13. Students who receive an “ungraded/U” may not continue this subject to A-Level.

The above qualifications are considered to be equivalent to the final diplomas of all countries in the EU. They are therefore equivalent to the IB, French Bac, German Abitur etc.

Registration Time

For Secondary School students, the bell rings at 08h45 to mark the beginning of registration. *You should already be on School premises and go to your form room when the bell rings.* The second bell rings at 08h55 and is the signal to leave registration and move to your first lesson. At 09h00 the third bell rings denoting the beginning of your lesson.

In the afternoon, the bell rings at 14h05 for registration and 14h15 to begin the afternoon lessons.

Reports

You will receive written School Reports during the year. In addition, there will be two parents’ evenings - one at the end of the first half term to give you and your parents an accurate idea of how the year is going and another in the spring term.

Report Grades

The grading system used at Mougins School is shown below. A grade is awarded for **attainment**, **effort** and **behaviour** using the descriptors below. Please read them carefully:

Scooters and Student Cars

All scooter riders and car drivers are asked to enter and leave the campus road at a slow speed to ensure the safety of children and parents in the car park. When entering or leaving the campus, please use the correct entrances and exits and observe the use of the roundabouts above and below the School. Students **must** park their cars in the top car park at the far end of the campus. They should arrive in time to find a space.

Students coming to School on scooters must wear a crash helmet and gloves.

Stationery and Equipment

In the Secondary School, you will need various exercise books and file paper for different subjects. Exercise books and file paper are sold in School. Subject teachers will let you know in the first couple of days your exact requirements or you can check your Family Guide. In addition, you should have the normal

writing implements, erasers, calculators etc. that should be brought to every lesson.

Student Council

Each form in the Secondary School elects two representatives to be on the Student Council. The Council meets on a regular basis with two or three teachers to raise issues of student concern, organise parties and discos for students and liaise from time to time with the Parent Teachers Association (PTA) regarding their social functions.

Tutors and Tutorial Time

Your form will generally have two tutors. Your tutors will mark the register in the mornings and afternoons and will be the members of staff who monitor your overall progress and well being at school. If you have any problems relating to your life at School, or indeed out of School, your tutor is there to listen and help you as much as they can.

Universities

When you leave School, you may wish to continue studying at University level. In Forms 11 and 12, we will already be introducing you to the university system so you have time to think about the direction that you want to take when you leave school. In Form 13, you will be involved in your application. We are members of the International Schools Careers Organisation (ISCO), which can help students with careers' advice and therefore course to follow at university. Students in Form 11 will automatically be involved in Futurewise – a Morrisby Testing system to start the process of university options and career advice.

The Form 12 and 13 tutors – currently Mrs Povall and Mr Horsfall for Form 12 and Mr Beckwith and Mr Hickmore for Form 13 – are the members of staff who will be helping you with your application.

Valuables

Elsewhere in this guide, we have mentioned jewellery and portable phones. In your own interest, it is unwise to bring items of value or large sums of money to School. If you do have to bring a sum of money that you are not going to use immediately, either lock it in your locker or entrust it to a member of staff as soon as you arrive at School. It is not advisable to leave valuables in your bag unattended in corridors or outside. We like to think that we have an honest community, but to avoid loss or temptation it is better to be “safe than sorry”.

Wet Days

Although these are rare, they do happen! You will be able to go to your form room if it is raining at break or lunch time. There are also cold days in the winter when the same applies. Members of staff on duty will be popping in and out, but when they are not there, you are expected to sit down quietly and chat with friends or work. Ball games cannot be transferred from outside to inside on wet days!!

Xpectations

The main reason for being at School is to learn. Above all, you are expected to work to the best of your ability in all subjects, academic, cultural and sporting. There is no excuse for any student to receive 3s and 4s for effort on their reports. (1 is excellent and 5 represents no effort made). If you listen and participate fully in your lessons, do your class work and homework to be best of your ability and hand it in on time, you will be doing a very good job as a student.

Yearbook

Throughout the year, a team of students and staff work on the annual Yearbook. This is a hardbound book with coloured photographs, drawings, paintings and text showing all the events that have taken place at School throughout the year. There is also a page for each form and so every student is in the book.
